

## Creating Links in Articles

### External Links

An external link goes to a different website. Once you click on an external link, you are no longer on the SOCS site.

External links can open in a new window or an existing window. Most often you will want the new site to open in a new window so your visitor still has your site open and available for further browsing.

The easiest way to create an external link in an article is to insert a hyperlink in the body of your article. Follow these easy steps:

1. In the text of the article, highlight the word or words that reference the website and click on the hyperlink icon.
2. Type the complete address of the website in the screen that displays.
3. To have the link open in a new window select “new window” in the target frame drop-down box.
4. Click on “OK” to create the link.
5. Preview your article to test your hyperlink.

### Internal Links

Internal links are links to other parts of your SOCS site. These will usually consist of links to static pages or files on your site.

Examples might be links to your calendar, lunch menu, or forms.

### Links to Articles

Each SOCS article has a unique URL that consists of the year/month/day/and article ID. To link to other SOCS articles, you must have this unique identifier. You can find an article’s ID by using the “Search Articles” feature in the Editor’s module.

### Finding the URL

The easiest way to get the URL to an article is to browse to it on your site. To do this, it must be an approved article. Click on the article and then copy the URL out of the address/location bar in the browser, and use that to make your link.

When creating links to other articles on your site, it is recommended that you use the article headline for the descriptive link text.

If you are linking to an expired article via a hyperlink and you want an expanded view, you will need to locate and copy the article ID the same way. Edit the article ID, by typing “EXP” after “ART” and the expired article will display in an expanded view.

## Related Sites Links


The Related Sites box will automatically create the links, which always open in a separate window. The idea behind the Related Sites is to provide additional websites that the reader would find useful. These websites may not be specifically referred to in an article, but deal with the same subject matter.

The entire link must be included and entered correctly or it will not work.

## E-mail Address Links

The best way to create an orderly list of e-mail addresses is by using a table. Once you are in the Article Editor, follow these steps to create an e-mail list:

1. Fill in the Headline (something like Staff Directory or Staff E-mails).
2. Place the cursor where you want the table to appear in the body of the article, click on “Table” on the tool bar and choose “Insert Table”.
3. Choose as many rows as you have e-mail addresses to enter.
4. Choose as many columns as needed (3 columns will allow for name, position, and e-mail address).
5. Click on “OK”.
6. In the first cell in the first column, enter the staff member’s name.
7. Tab to the second column and enter the position.
8. Tab to the third column. Click on the hyperlink icon on the tool bar (or click on “Insert” on the tool bar and select “Hyperlink”).
9. When the hyperlink screen appears, select “E-Mail Address” on the left side of the screen.



10. Text to display:

- If you **do not want the actual e-mail address to appear**, enter either e-mail address or staff member’s name.
- If you **want the actual e-mail address to appear**, type the e-mail address in this box

11. E-mail Address: Type the desired E-mail Address

12. Disregard the rest of the screen.

13. Click “OK”.
